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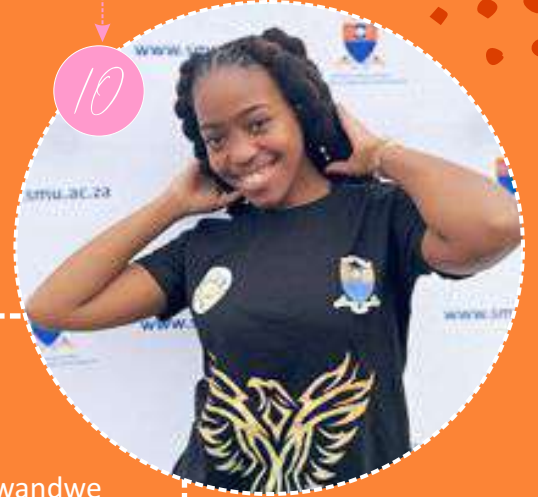

“The School of Oral Health Sciences has been plagued by many leadership and governance issues, which resulted in major disruptions of the academic programme. The situation has been addressed through the interventions put in place by the Vice-Chancellor and Senior Management”, **said Prof Mawela.**



The 4th of August was the beginning of a new journey for the BDS final year students of the Sefako Makgatho Health Sciences University as they started with the final clinical year. The School of Oral Health Sciences honoured the BDS V students with the 'White Coat' and Oath Taking Ceremonies. Lecturers and parents were invited to witness this thrilling moment.

Senior Lecturer and Acting Head of the Department of Integrated Clinical Dentistry (ICD) Dr Kebiditswe Masike used the occasion to congratulate the students on reaching their milestones. She explained that the white coat ceremony is held every year as part of the orientation of BDS V students into final year, and to the Comprehensive Care Clinic (CCC), where they will be treating their patients.

The purpose of the ceremony was to welcome the BDS V students to the final level of their programme; to remind the students of their roles and responsibilities as members of the healthcare team and as healthcare professionals providing

Prof Dini Mawela took the parents through the process, from grooming a dental student to producing a good dental surgeon and the challenges they come across during the process.

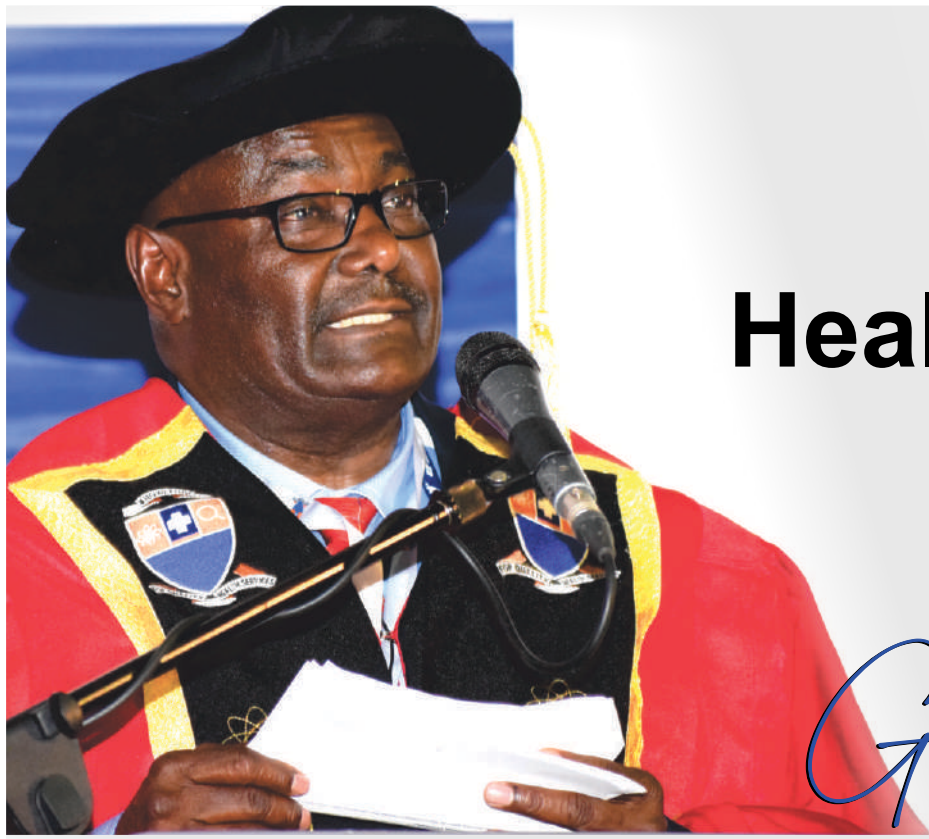
Mawela also said COVID-19 was extremely disruptive, particularly in programmes that are clinical and require hands-on training, this pushed the university to rapidly pivot into remote online teaching and learning strategies.

“Online teaching was provided on the Blackboard platform. As soon as the lockdown regulations were relaxed, students were able to return to campus,” added Prof Mawela.

The School of Oral Health Sciences is now doing well and the students are making sure that they regain time lost during the COVID-19 pandemic and are working hard to finally complete their respective qualifications.

Sefako Makgatho Health Sciences University recently hosted symbolic in-person Graduation Ceremonies

The symbolic in-person graduation ceremonies took place at Sefako Makgatho Health Sciences University recently over a period of two days from 20 to 21 September 2022 for the cohorts of students who graduated virtually in 2020 and 2021 respectively as a result of the Covid-19 restrictions enforced by government at the time. Professor Peter Mbatia in his capacity as Acting Chancellor presided over the ceremony and also awarded Degrees to a group of students who could not attend the May 2022 physical graduations ceremonies due to reasons beyond their control.

Speaking at the ceremonies, newly appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor Academic and Research Professor Tandi Matsha - Erasmus in her capacity as Acting Vice-Chancellor congratulated all graduates and commended them for defying the odds to eventually complete their studies in the midst of Covid-19 and other geopolitical factors and challenges. Matsha - Erasmus further urged the graduates to remain humble and kind especially to those who assisted them to attain their qualifications. She commended Prof Mbatia for his leadership of the University adding that the work he has done remains visible. The Acting Vice-Chancellor challenged the graduates to fight corruption and any form of maladministration wherever and reminded them that they are joining multitudes of SMU Alumni whom the University is proud of.

Families and friends came to support graduates as they walked the stage and got an opportunity to take photographs as part of creating memories. Qualifications were awarded in different fields of study from the Five Schools of the University namely; Schools of Medicine, Health Care Sciences, Oral Health Sciences, Pharmacy as well as Science and Technology.

SMU is on a trajectory of growth and success and plays a pivotal role in producing quality graduates to serve the health and sciences fraternities. The University is home to National Research Foundation (NRF) rated researchers and academics.



From repeating her first year to representing South Africa in the 10th International Pharmaceutical Student Federation Annual Symposium in Tanzania – **Siphiwe Khumalo's** story of resilience

“Growing up in a place where a girl child is not allowed nor encouraged to attend varsity was very much disheartening. But I was determined to complete a University Degree and be somebody in life and not fall into the customs and norms of where I came from, being expected to get married after passing my matric. It is through that passion and determination that I became the first girl in my village to attend and attain a University Degree”.

Ms Siphiwe Khumalo explains that she grew up in a village where it was not believed a girl child should further their education to tertiary level. It dawned on her that it was not going to be easy for her to further her studies following the death of both her parents. It was her mother's wish that she should further her studies and become a doctor. This wish kept her going despite the difficulties she had to endure.

“When I was in grade 12 my family looked for a rich old man for me to get married to but I refused. I knew if I got married I would not be allowed to further my studies and that is not the life I wanted for myself.

She explains that upon completing matric in 2015, one of her high school teachers helped her register at the University of Limpopo in Turfloop to study Pharmacy in 2016. “The first year did not go so well; I was admitted at a hospital for 6 months due to some health complications. It was a very difficult thing because I had to repeat the year. When I got discharged my HOD, then Prof Patrick Demana who is now the Dean of the School of Pharmacy at SMU helped me get transferred to Tshwane University of Technology in 2017 where I started the degree from first year.

Siphiwe was credited some modules that she had already passed from her previous institution and completed the degree in 2020 at TUT. Before she could start attending classes at TUT, she worked as a bar lady at Lanseria airport and managed to save money as she did not have enough financial support. She however credits her godparents in Pretoria west who continue to take care of her. Following completion of her Degree, she got an opportunity to do an internship in one hospital but chose to continue with her studies.

She decided to come to SMU to do a Masters in Public Health Pharmacy and Management. She finds SMU to be a different environment where her own School is supportive of her dreams as demonstrated recently when she represented South Africa in Tanzania during the 10th International Pharmaceutical Student Federation annual symposium for the African Region that took place from 16 to 17 July 2022.

Siphiwe was also afforded an opportunity to be a moderator for one of the sessions in the symposium which gave her an opportunity to have conversations with some of the most influential people in the pharmaceutical industry globally.

“I was chosen to moderate a session on digitalization of systems in medical supply chain in this era. My job was to work with the panel to get as much information on where are we headed as Africa with regards to supply chain in the medical sector. Supply chain is a very important system within the sector that helps us be effective and efficient in the supply of medication at all levels. For a hospital to run out of medication for instance, may be due of some form of a glitch within the supply chain system”.

“My vision is to venture into health economics, to be able to analyse the cost of intervention when treating a patient and dealing with national insurance that aims to attain universal health coverage. It is those things that interest me the most in health economics. Being able to appropriate finances in the health sector”.

Following her participation at the symposium, she is in talks with an organization to collaborate with them in new technological developments in the medical supply chain. “I am very much grateful for the support and encouragement I get at SMU. My department has shown great enthusiasm in my journey and have funded me for the previous trip”, she said.

Siphiwe is headed for another symposium which will take place in Ghana in 2023 and she is appealing for further support. She wishes for an international scholarship to do a PhD or work locally moving forward.

So Rhoda, how do you stay confident in yourself?

I am Christian, I am not what the world tells me I am. I am whom God says I am. He validates me. I was born to share this; I was made for it. What I do yields confidence in me. Additionally, I have learnt that I am capable and that I too can stand for something and my voice needs to be heard.

With varied beauty perceptions and the influence of social media expectations, how would you advise young girls, and ladies, to remain true to their kind of beauty?

God doesn't make mistakes. You are you for a reason, there is nothing wrong with the way you are. Worldly perceptions are ever-changing. BE YOU! They must also be aware that one has to go through challenges such as self-doubt, comparison, and looking for outside validation is a constant mind battles. There are also, financial limitations to doing charity work. For me to keep sane, I write a lot and pray.

You mentioned earlier that a beauty queen is of service to others, how do you keep in touch with your community?

I do soup drive, like I said I love food, what better way to share that with people? (Laughs). I also do career talks on Facebook and engage high scholars on career paths and what SMU offers. I am still learning to find a place for other interests in my life. In future, one would like to tap more into fundraising. The puzzle will eventually fit together.

So where from here, what can we expect from you?

Living in freedom, the full expression of myself. To keep on going for what I want. I would love to host Miss Soweto 2024. And yes, hopefully, miss SA. I want to serve and represent SA on an international stage.

SRC Reviews Academic Exclusion Policy

The SMU SRC members recently held a session in Rustenburg to review the Academic Exclusion policy and procedures. The University requires students to maintain a satisfactory level of academic progress in their study programmes and to complete their studies within the maximum time allowed. The policy and procedures give guidance to be applied when students fail to meet the above requirement. Furthermore, appropriate interventions and systems of support are expected to reduce dropout rates and exclusions and improve throughputs and completion rates.

“The Academic Policy Workshop was thoroughgoing in engagements, there were high quality discussions informed by the desire to balance access to higher education with the high standards and quality of SMU. The SMU SRC displayed a high level of insight and pragmatism and was able to advance good points in preparation for the presentation to the Senate and Council. The arguments they advanced were convincing and fundamentally strong,” said Tembile Yako, session Facilitator.

The policy clearly outlines its purpose of providing a comprehensive set of principles and procedures to be followed when dealing with students who have failed to maintain a satisfactory level of academic achievement in their studies as prescribed in the General Rules and applicable School Rules, and want to reapply for admission to the current or another study programme. It clarifies the roles and responsibilities of the various Committees of the University on matters of academic exclusion and ensures that underperforming students are identified early and offered academic support, and personal or career counselling/advice.

“Suitable interventions and systems of support are expected to reduce dropout rates and exclusions and to improve throughputs and completion rates. Also to indicate appropriate interventions and actions to be implemented for students at risk,” said Daniel Masekwameng, Secretary General of the SRC.



Physiotherapy Students Receive Scrubs for Clinical Training

The Universal Health Comps Care Medical Scheme organized a scrub handover ceremony for the third-year physiotherapy students at Sefako Makgatho Health Sciences University (SMU).
